You might want to have a mid-year review of this to see how you are doing. Are you offering everyone an opportunity to participate? Have you celebrated an event? Do you recognize member achievements? Are you having fun?

The theme for this ceremony is Welcome.

Suggestions for the ceremony:

You might want to have the participants stand together with each one holding a large example of the letter they are talking about as they light their candle and say their piece.

OR

Set up a table with eight candle holders – one for you and the other seven for your members representing the word WELCOME. You light your candle, say your piece (the introduction) and call on Member 1. Member 1 would light their candle from your lit candle and say their piece, followed by the other Members 2-7.

Do it however you want that will work for your Grange.

## 2018 Candle Lighting Ceremony - WELCOME

Lecturer Intro: I light this candle to represent our new Grange year. Our organization prides itself on being one that WELCOMEs everyone. As we begin a new Grange year, let's reflect on some of the qualities and/or characteristics of Grange members and the organization as a whole.

Member 1: I light this candle for the letter W – We <u>WELCOME</u> everyone and promote wholesome, family – friendly activities. Everyone should have an opportunity to participate in our meetings and programs. The 1+ Junior Program and Junior Grange Camps can offer opportunities for our youngest members to participate.

Member 2: I light this candle for the letter E – The Grange is an <u>Enduring</u> organization. We just celebrated the 150<sup>th</sup> birthday of the National Grange and with our continued participation we will be a viable grassroots organization for many more years.

Member 3: I light this candle for the letter L – The <u>Lessons</u> we learn through the ritual of the first five degrees of our order can be the guidance we use to make our way through life: Faith, Hope, Charity, Fidelity, and Perseverance.

Member 4: I light this candle for the letter C – <u>Celebrate</u> whenever we can – make the meetings fun!
