

Monday, February 27, 2023 (day 50 of the 120-day session)

The past week of legislative session has been focused on the fiscal committees, as the policy committee deadline came and went last Friday night. House Appropriations and Senate Ways & Means have been working to hear and pass policy bills that also require public dollars to implement. Friday, February 24 marked the day of fiscal committee cutoff for the first half of the session. The next step is bills that are in their house of origin must be passed off their respective floors by March 8th. This deadline looms particularly large this year given the amount of bills we have seen introduced.

On Thursday the Senate Ways & Means Committee was scheduled to hear 52 bills for executive session. Executive session is the official vote on the bill. Of those 52 bills, eleven of them received "No Action", meaning they did not pass the committee on that day. Short of being voted out of committee before 11:59pm on Friday night, the remaining road for these bills will be the budget process through a legislative mechanism called "Necessary to Implement the Budget (NTIB)".

What is NTIB?

A bill that gets tagged Necessary to Implement Budget or "NTIB", is when a bill's funding has been included in the operating budget, but the bill's policy has not yet passed the legislature to become law. For instance, if the budget included funding for Famers Markets that stemmed from a policy change, but the bill to adjust the policy hadn't passed yet, that bill would be tagged NTIB and not subject to the cut-off calendar. It would have the remainder of the session to get through the legislature because the budget bill could not be implemented without it. We will keep our eyes out for potential NTIB bills as they pertain to our legislation.

Relevant Bill Updates:

Riparian- The Riparian saga of 2023 continues as dueling bills have been discussed along the way. The Governor's more heavy-handed approach legislation has fallen to the policy cutoff calendar and will not be heard again this session. But that doesn't mean its "dead". Read further for explanation. The bill that is still alive is the bipartisan bill HB 1720. This is the collaboration between Agriculture, the Tribes, Democrats and Republicans. This voluntary grant program was heard in the House Capital Budget committee last week and subsequently scheduled for a vote. But when the committee broke for executive session, the bill was set aside with no vote and no schedule of further action. Because of the capital budget implications of this bill, it may or may not come up again this session if it missed the fiscal policy deadline on February 24th. We will see if any portion of this gets tagged as NTIB and becomes part of the conversation later in the session.

<u>Pesticide- HB 1019</u> – Representative Dent's pesticide advisory board bill is still on schedule to clear the House of origin cut off. The bill rests safely in the Rules committee as of this writing and has until March 8th to make it off the floor.

<u>Transportation – SB 5251</u> is a the CDL transportation bill we have been engaged in. This bill reduces the fee charged by (DOL) for a skills examination for a commercial motor vehicle license and lowers the number of attempts to pass the examination for the payment of each fee from two to one. It also removes the requirement that an applicant for the renewal of a commercial driver's license apply in person at a licensing service office. This bill has made it clear of the cutoffs and awaits a floor vote in the Senate.

Ag Overtime – SB 5476 – We have been paying attention this 12-week exemption policy for agriculture employers and were eager to participate should this bill get traction. Unfortunately, it appears that this legislation is "dead" for the session but will be up for consideration in the 2024 session.

You will receive and email with a link for the hearing. At the appropriate time, join the meeting and wait to be admitted.

When you are called to speak, introduce yourself and speak for 1-2 minutes.

To prepare, write down what you want to say. Read it aloud several times. Time yourself.
