

Tuesday, January 30, 2024 (day 23 of the 60-day Session)

Week three of the legislative session brought a feverish pace as we race towards the first milestone – policy committee cutoff. Wednesday, January 31stth marks the day where bills have to be voted out of their policy committee in order to advance and stay "alive" this session. This only includes "policy" bills that do not require taxpayer dollars to implement. Fiscal bills have a longer timeline as they will be cutoff on February 5th. This week also happens to be the Career and Technical Student Organizations (CTSO) legislative days. CTE student leaders participate in a training session Thursday night and will be around the capitol campus all day Friday, January 26th. The CTSO's come to the capitol this time each year to spread awareness about their programs and advocate for any timely causes that might be appropriate and meet their local elected representatives.

Bill Highlights

Wolf Legislation

HB 2424 -This bill charges the Department of Fish and Wildlife with engaging the Confederated Tribes of the Colville Reservation on a government-to-government basis to align gray wolf management strategies in certain areas. We view this as a positive policy as the Colville Tribes have long had a progressive and effective wolf management plan. This bill is scheduled for a vote on January 31st.

HB 2423 Requires the Department of Fish and Wildlife to convene a workgroup to develop a regional management plan for gray wolves in the portion of Eastern Washington where gray wolves are not federally listed as threatened or endangered. Again, this is viewed as a favorable proposal.

Agriculture Overtime

SB 5476 - Authorizing agricultural employers to select 12 weeks a year to employ workers for up to 50 hours a week before overtime applies.

This is a 2023 bill which was introduced in the last session and is scheduled for a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Labor & Commerce January 30th. The senate bill gives agricultural employers the

ability to designate 12 weeks each year as special circumstance weeks. During these special circumstance weeks, time-and-a-half overtime would come into effect after 50 hours of work in a week.

Firearms Legislation

SB 5444 - Concerning firearm sensitive places. - This bill restricts where law abiding gun owners can carry weapons in specific areas. The bill makes it a crime to possess a gun in public places including: parks, zoo's, aquariums, transit centers, all state and local public buildings, and transit centers serving passengers. These restrictions do not apply to individuals who maintain a valid conceal carry license or correctional personnel.

<u>HB 1902- Enhancing requirements for the purchase</u> or transfer of firearms.

This bill establishes that a dealer may not transfer a firearm to a purchaser or transferee unless the person has a valid permit to purchase firearms and establishes requirements for the application, issuance, and revocation of permits to purchase firearms. The bill also provides proof of completion of required firearms safety training must be provided to obtain a permit to purchase firearms, updates training program components, and requires the Washington State Patrol to certify training programs. This bill had a public hearing on January 16th and has not been scheduled for a vote as of January 26th.

HB 1903 - Reporting lost or stolen firearms.

Requires a person who suffers a loss or theft of a firearm to report the loss or theft to local law enforcement within 24 hours. Also requires law enforcement to enter information received in a report of the loss or theft of a firearm into the National Crime Information Center database. This bill was passed out of committee on January 19th on a party line vote and awaits a floor vote.

HB 2021 - Concerning the disposition of privately owned firearms in the custody of state or local government entities or law enforcement agencies. Authorizes local governments and law enforcement agencies to dispose of forfeited firearms through a transfer to a museum or historical society. The bill

also charges the Washington State Patrol with disposing of forfeited firearms through a transfer to a museum or historical society, or destruction. This bill was voted out of committee on January 16th on a party line vote.

<u>HB 2054 - Concerning bulk purchases and transfers of firearms.</u>

This bill Prohibits firearms dealers from delivering more than one firearm to a purchaser or transferee within any 30-day period. The bill was heard on January 16th and has yet to have a vote.

HB 2118 - Protecting the public from gun violence by establishing additional requirements for the business operations of licensed firearms dealers.

This bill requires firearm dealer employees to be 21 or older, and to undergo fingerprinting and a background check prior to selling or transferring any firearms. It also requires dealers to adopt specified security features, alarm systems, safe storage practices, surveillance systems, and record keeping practices. Charges dealers to review and respond to trace requests within 24 hours; notify law enforcement of any loss, theft, or unlawful transfer within 24 hours; and provide an annual report to the Attorney General. This will was voted out of committee on January 19th and awaits a floor vote.

Interesting bill

HB 2018- Improving student outcomes by restricting mobile device use by public school students. This bill requires OSPI to select pilot sites to implement a strategy to restrict student mobile device use during instructional hours and to report to the OSPI with certain information related to implementing the restriction. It also charges OSPI to report to the Legislature with a summary of research on policies and procedures restricting student mobile device use during instructional hours and recommendations for successful restriction strategies. This bill appears to be on track to clear the 1/31 cutoff as it had a favorable hearing on January 23rd and is scheduled for a vote on January 30th.

As a reminder you can easily participate in the lawmaking process by contacting your elected state representatives through the online legislative tools.

Start here: https://app.leg.wa.gov/csiremote/

Select House or Senate

Committee: Choose the committee where you bill is being heard

Meetings: Choose the date of the hearing

Select the bill you want from the list.

Select:

I would like to submit written testimony.

I would like to testify live during the hearing.

I would like my position noted for the legislative record.

You may check to see who else has signed in to testify.

On the next screen, fill in all the blanks and submit.

You will receive an email with a link for the hearing. At the appropriate time, join the meeting and wait to be admitted.

When you are called to speak, introduce yourself and speak for 1-2 minutes.

To prepare, write down what you want to say. Read it aloud several times. Time yourself.
