

Monday, February 12, 2024 (day 38 of the 60-day Session)

February 5th marked the final day for all bills to be out of policy and fiscal committees. The 5pm deadline ended the barrage of committee hearings that make up the first cutoff series of the session. For those of us at the capitol every day, the action turns to the marble floors of the legislative building as floor action voting will be taking place for the next week leading up to the February 13th floor cutoff date.

By February 13th all bills must be successfully passed off of their respective "house of origin" floor in order to play in the second half of the game. The next week is often filled with late nights and political gamesmanship as there is a limited supply of time to pass all of the bills left to be considered. This week we also see a lot of action from the Rules committee.

The <u>House</u> and <u>Senate</u> Rules committee are little known bodies that carry a lot of power. These committees are the step between the policy committees and floor vote where senior members of the legislature approve bills to be considered on the house and senate floor. The rules committee is generally chaired by the state Lieutenant Governor and the body sets the schedule for the floor calendar of consideration.

Bill Highlight

SB 5770 - Providing state and local property tax reform.

The meat and potatoes of this bill is that it lifts the 1% property tax increase lid per year and moves it up to 3% per year. While property tax revenue organically grows on its own through valuation increases, the majority party is seeking to increase that lid from 1% per year to 3% per year, having an effect of a 300% jump in the amount your property taxes can increase each year.

For background on this, the voters of Washington State approved Initiative-747 in 2001 capping the property tax increase at 1%. The initiative won approval by a wide 15-point margin. Then in 2007 our state supreme court ruled the initiative to be unconstitutional which prompted Governor Gregoire

to call a special session for the purpose of codifying the 1% cap into law through statute. The legislature passed that bill in a one-day session by a vote count of 86-8 in the House, and 39-9 in the Senate making the law part of statute. Senate Bill 5770 seeks to overturn this initiative and implement the new tax rates. During testimony of the bill 7,529 individuals across the state signed in "con" which represented 94% all of people who signed in on the bill.

Select House or Senate

Committee: Choose the committee where you bill is

being heard

Meetings: Choose the date of the hearing

Select the bill you want from the list.

Select:

I would like to submit written testimony.

I would like to testify live during the hearing.I would like my position noted for the legislative record.

You may check to see who else has signed in to testify.

On the next screen, fill in all the blanks and submit. You will receive an email with a link for the hearing. At the appropriate time, join the meeting and

hearing. At the appropriate time, join the meeting and wait to be admitted.

When you are called to speak, introduce yourself and speak for 1-2 minutes.

To prepare, write down what you want to say. Read it aloud several times. Time yourself.
