

Tuesday, February 20, 2024 (day 46 of the 60-day Session)

We have started the second half of the legislative session with February 13<sup>th</sup> marking the final day for bills to get off their respective floors which turned Monday night into a marathon bill session as the public watched the house of representatives vote on bills until 2:31am. But with that cutoff being passed the lawmakers are now able to go back to committee work and consider the remaining bills.

You will notice a larger-than-usual "upcoming events" section as the next week(s) of the legislature are the most important. Serious bills that made it to the second half will be heard at a feverish pace as the two bodies try to agree on what to pass and what to let expire by fate of the calendar.

The first version of the capital budget was released on Thursday as lawmakers began to see the numbers from the revenue forecast trickle in. The Senate delivered their capital spending document which you can view <u>here</u>. We expect to see the first version of the operating budgets on February 20<sup>th</sup> and the House of Representatives will hear the first version of the operating budget on February 21<sup>st</sup> at 4:00pm

# <u>SB 5770 - Providing state and local property tax</u> reform.

In the last legislative update this bill was highlighted that it lifts 1% property tax increase lid per year and moves it up to 3% per year. The bill author has decided to pull this bill from consideration, and it is now considered dead for the session. Public input from this was overwhelming and had a major role in slowing this down and leading to its ultimate demise.

HB 1589- Supporting Washington's clean energy economy and transitioning to a clean, affordable, and reliable energy future.

This is the gas utility connection bill that would impact the offering of natural gas service in Western Washington, and if passed by both chambers, would change the legal requirement of <u>Puget Sound</u> <u>Energy</u> (PSE) to provide natural gas service to customers when requested. It would impact nearly 800,000 households across six counties in

Washington. Earlier versions of the bill resulted in a ban on natural gas connection, but subsequent substitute versions have pared down the ban into simply relieving the utility of the requirement to connect natural gas to new customers. The Grange team met with the bill's author, Rep. Doglio, this past week to discuss the potential impacts of the bill on our members. Further discussions are in the works if it appears that this bill will continue to move. We discussed ways to cause no harm to rural construction and utility connection. The bill is designed to meet the clean energy goals set forth in the Climate Commitment Act (CCA) and does not ban natural gas connection like earlier versions did, but it does give the utility the discretion based on profit and loss metrics the utility company. to

As every "cut off" date comes and goes, more bills are eliminated from the equation and some fiscal bills are added such as the three budget documents.

## How to Testify on Bills this Year

As a reminder you can easily participate in the lawmaking process by contacting your elected state representatives through the online legislative tools.

Start here: https://app.leg.wa.gov/csiremote/ Select House or Senate

Committee: Choose the committee where you bill is being heard

Meetings: Choose the date of the hearing

Select the bill you want from the list. **Select:** 

I would like to submit written testimony.

I would like to testify live during the hearing. I would like my position noted for the legislative record.

You may check to see who else has signed in to testify.

On the next screen, fill in all the blanks and submit.

You will receive an email with a link for the hearing. At the appropriate time, join the meeting and wait to be admitted.

When you are called to speak, introduce yourself and speak for 1-2 minutes.

To prepare, write down what you want to say. Read it aloud several times. Time yourself.
