






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Grange Youth Leadership Exchange

New for 2019 Submission Deadline: March 1

The Grange's fraternal bonds connect our members from coast to coast. To strengthen the bonds of state Grange youth departments, the National Grange Youth Department is launching its leadership exchange program.

This program is designed to have a team of Grange youth and young adults travel with a team leader to another state to experience a Grange event in another state or provide assistance to a Grange youth department for a state-level project. The Grangers will also have the opportunity to explore the host state.

Exchange programs provide opportunities to travel, sightsee, meet new people, make new friends, explore expanding interests, experience how others live and see other Grangers in action. Exchange programs, properly planned and conducted, can be an important educational experience. Once the forms are received, the National Grange Youth Development Director will work with interested states to pair up states. Once paired, it will be the responsibility of the two states to finalize when and what activities will be included in the exchange.

To participate:

- 1. The State Grange Youth Director or Master will submit an interest form to the National Grange Youth Director on March 1. The list will include members of the youth leadership team and a team leader.
- 2. The team leader must be at least 22 years old and appointed by the state Master and/or youth director. State youth directors can serve as the team leader.
- 3. Team members are responsible for raising funds to cover their travel costs, including housing, meals, travel and other related costs.
- 4. Host states will be responsible for organizing at least one fun event for the visiting team to experience the state outside of a Grange function. It could be to visit a state capitol, popular landmark, or other location.
- 5. Participants should be involved in the design and implementation of the exchange.
- 6. Events youth could assist with include, but are not limited to, youth camps, junior camps, state sessions, Grange lock-ins, teen weekends or another state-level event that includes youth participation. The teams can assist with workshops, interactive activities or other activities the host state believes will benefit both states.
- 7. Members are expected to participate in the majority of leadership team functions.

Grange Youth Focus Areas Contest

Submit by Sept. 1

The best and most viable programs for large-scale use or replication will be included in the Grange Youth Program Guide. The Grange encourages all Grange Youth to develop programs around the following topics, test them in their Subordinate, Pomona or State Granges, and develop a summary of the project using the following format.

TOPICS:

- a. Making a Difference in Your Community
- b. Agriculture Advocacy/Education
- c. Citizenship/Grassroots Advocacy

Submit to the National Grange Youth Development Director by Sept. 1, 2019 a summary of the way in which your Grange took on the topic, the program/project developed around the focus area, the roles designated by the group and how the group made decisions, the timeline, project funding/support necessary, and outcome. The summary should include a list of all Grange participants and numbers on those who actively participated and an estimate and description of those who subsequently benefited from the event/program. You should also include a summary of media coverage/media content distribution related to the program or event such as an overview of articles found in your Grange newsletter about the program, copies of advertisements/posts made on social media about the program and/or news stories.

Submissions will be judged based on creativity, repeatability at other Grange events and advancement/education of the topic area. First place for each category will receive \$50. All submissions will receive a certificate and will be included in a youth idea book.

Youth Community Service Award

New for 2019 in conjunction with National Grange Community Service Dept.

Community Service is an integral part of the Grange that allows local members to interact and serve the communities where they reside. The National Grange will continue to recognize winners on the state level. The National Grange Youth Department and National Grange Community Service Department are pleased to announce the National Grange Youth Community Service Award.

State Masters, State Youth Committees and/or State Community Service Committees can nominate a Grange youth/young adult, between the ages of 14 and 35, or a group of Grange Youth for the award. The application deadline is September 1, 2019.

State winners will receive a certificate and be recognized at National Session during Youth Leadership Days. The Community Service and Youth Departments will organize a committee to select one overall winner. The overall winner will receive a plaque in recognition of their achievements. Horticultural education was a passion of Wib Justi, first National Grange Youth Development Director. He was involved with NJHA, fostering a partnership between the two organizations.

Horticulture Identification and Judging Contest

Purpose of the Contest

The production, marketing and buying of fruit, vegetable, flower and ornamental crops requires a detailed knowledge of many subject matter disciplines. This contest is a training program concerned with teaching youth to recognize and identify some of the most important horticultural crops, to learn criteria influencing quality and to be able to answer questions and solve problems relating to the art and science of horticulture.

Rules and Regulations

Team Guidelines

- A. The Grange team consists of 3 or 4 individuals aged 14-21.
- B. Contestants who have previously placed first (Grand National Award Winner) or been a member of a first place team will participate in the Honors Division.
- C. The top individual in the Honors Division is automatically ineligible for further competition.
- D. Coaches and other individuals not competing in the contest will not be allowed in the contest room while the contest is being conducted. After the last paper has been turned in the contest room will be open for observation and photography of the identification and judging sections. Answers will be placed on the entries.
- E. Entry Deadline: September 15. Consult with your leader for additional information.

Contest Format

The horticulture contest consists of three sections (Judging: 80 pts., Identification: 200 pts. [250 pts. for honors] and Horticultural Knowledge: 160 pts.) for a total point score of 440 pts. (490 pts. for honors).

Judging

Eight classes of four (4) plates each will be judged on the basis of condition, quality, uniformity, true totype, and size. Two classes will be taken from the list of four commodity groups to be identified/judged (fruits and nuts, vegetables and herbs, flowering and indoor plants and woody ornamentals). Plates in each class will be ranked from first to last. Scores will be determined by a Hormel calculator. Oral reasons will not be required of contestants.

Information

Eighty (80) objective questions (true-false and multiple choice) will be taken from information in this study manual and on this section of the website. Questions will test the contestant's knowledge of cultural practices for horticultural crops, plant science, pesticides, horticultural careers and other topics related to the production, processing and consumption of horticultural crops.

Identification

One hundred samples (100) will make up the third segment of the contest. Twenty-five (25) samples will be taken from each of the four (4) commodity groups. These commodity groups will be separated onto different tables and the participant will have a complete list of all items which could potentially appear. Specimens may be alive or preserved plant parts such as, but not limited to: stems, twigs, leaves, flowers, seeds, fruits, roots, bulbs, tubers, or plant products. Participants in the honors division of the contest will identify 25 additional specimens. The specimens will come from all four groups and will not be segregated by category (randomly mixed).

Awards

Up to 5 teams and 10 individuals may receive medals based on the number of entries in each division. The top individual and team will receive gold medals; second place when awarded will receive silver medals; and any other placements awarded will receive copper medals. The top team in each division will also receive a plaque. Top individuals in each of the divisions may also be eligible for a cash prize when available. The highest overall scoring individual of all the divisions is also eligible for a monetary prize in years that monies for such are available.

2019 Grange Ritual Contest

Can you crack the Grange code? If so, you can present your skills at the National Grange Session and test your skills against other Grangers from across the country.

The winners of the contest will have to recite a portion of the opening ceremonies during the Evening of Excellence. Participants will be judged in their oral presentation of the code. There will be two categories:

Novice – for beginners learning the code (can compete in contest for up to 2 years.) Novice contest winners will advance to the Patron Contest next year.

Patron – for members with two or more years' experience.

The judge(s) will be selected by the High Priest, Assembly of Demeter, certified and able to issue the Award of Merit code reading card to qualifying members.

Novice contest

Novice contestants will present to the judge the following items from the code book: The Use of the Gavel, Degree Words (1st-4th) Annual Password, Voting Sign, Sign (1st-4th) and Patrons Grip. Novice contest winners will have to compete in the Patron Contest next year.

Patron contest

The Patron contest is designed to follow the code reading Award of Merit card requirements.

Parliamentary Procedure Contest

Purpose

The purpose of this contest is to encourage Grange youth and young adults to learn to effectively participate in a business meeting and to assist in the development of their leadership, public speaking, and problem solving skills.

Grange youth and young adult members will use parliamentary procedure to conduct an orderly and efficient meeting, following the meeting format, including the Grange opening and closing as prescribed in the subordinate Grange manual. Teams can follow the opening and closing ceremonies from the 2012 National Grange Subordinate Manual. The Parliamentary Authority for the contest shall be the most current edition of Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised.

As part of the contest, they will:

- Demonstrate knowledge of parliamentary law
- Conduct Grange business effectively
- Present a logical, realistic and convincing debate on motions
- Record complete and accurate minutes
- Present memorized speaking parts during the opening and closing ceremonies

Team members will be needed to fill the offices of Master, Overseer, Steward, Chaplain, Secretary and Gatekeeper. During the contest, the offices of Lady Assistant Steward, Assistant Steward, Lecturer, Treasurer, Ceres, Flora, Pomona and Executive Committee will be filled by non-competing Grange members. State Grange Youth Departments will host the state contest and may choose up to two teams to represent their state. Multi-state teams are permitted.

Event Rules

- 1. Notification of having a team is due to the National Youth Director by Sept. 1 of the contest year.
- 2. Team members must be qualified Grange members at the time of qualification. They must be between the ages of 14 35 as of January 1 of the contest year.
- 3. Teams will consist of a Master, Overseer, Steward, Gatekeeper, Chaplain, and Secretary. Additional offices will be filled by the Youth Officer Team.
- 4. The event will consist of the following activities: a.) Written Examination; b.) Opening Ceremonies; c.) Team Demonstration; d.) Closing Ceremonies; e.) Oral Questions.
- 5. Members will conduct a regular subordinate Grange meeting and demonstrate a designated main motion and four additional parliamentary procedure motions.
- 6. It is recommended that the meeting be conducted according to the most current Grange Subordinate Manual. Teams may use whichever opening version they prefer. Opening and Closing Ceremonies should be memorized.
- 7. The most current edition of Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised will be the Parliamentary Authority for the contest. If there is a discrepancy between RONR, the Grange Subordinate Manual, and the Digest of Laws, the Digest, followed by the Manual will override RONR.

Event Procedures

- 1. Team members should arrive at the contest location at least one hour prior to listed event start time to take the exam. Ex. if demonstration begins at 9 am, all team members should arrive by 8 am.
- 2. The room will be set up according to the Grange Manual. Station markers, cloths, and a timer will be provided.
- 3. All team members will be provided with paper and pencils to take notes during their demonstration.
- 4. Team members will have one minute immediately before their team's demonstration to look at their cards. They may not write on or mark the cards or confer/signal to each other during that time or the rest of the demonstration. This one minute will begin when the Master taps the gavel and will be timed

by a timer provided by contest coordinators.

- 5. Each member will receive a card listing the main motion and four additional permissible motions. An individual's required secondary motion will be marked by underlining and bolding that motion. The unmarked motions will be made by the other team members.
- 6. The Secretary will not be given a required motion. It is recommended that the secretary make the main motion for contest purposes. Minutes will only be judged in the event of a tie.
- 7. The demonstration will not be over 15 minutes. A time clock will be provided so the team can see. Time will begin when the Master signals with two taps raps of the gavel and will end at the conclusion of the Closing Ceremonies. A time keeper will hold up cards at the 10 and 14 minute marks if no clock can be provided.
- 8. Teams will begin Opening Ceremonies with team members seated at their stations. No Opening or Closing Drill will be performed. Assistants will walk room to examine and report and assume all members present are correct. The Salute to the Flag and Roll Call of Officers will be performed.
- 9. Team members should have opening and closing ceremonies memorized. Manuals will be available if they are not. However, 5 points will be deducted for each team member who uses assistance during opening ceremonies.
- 10. The order of business will begin at the conclusion of Opening Ceremonies and begin with the consideration of New Business. The motion to adjourn is not allowed.
- 11. Each team member will be required to present two debates. Each debate will be worth a maximum of points. If the member exceeds two debates during the demonstration, the top two debates will be counted.
- 12. Only one debate is allowed per motion per team member. The exception to this rule is the motion maker who may make two debates on that motion.
- 13. Only votes from the team should be counted. The additional officers (filled seats) will be instructed not to vote. Should they vote, their votes should be ignored for contest purposes.
- 14. Following the disposal of all New Business, the team will perform Closing Ceremonies.
- 15. Judges will ask one oral question (containing 1 -2 parts) of each team member at the conclusion of their demonstration. Members may not consult with or receive help from team members and must answer individually.
- 16. Business casual dress is highly recommended.
- 17. It is recommended that Opening Ceremonies take no more than 5 minutes, and Closing Ceremonies no more than 3 minutes. The remaining time should be used for the demonstration of New Business.

Written Test:

The 45-minute written test will consist of 25 questions covering:

- Opening and Closing Ceremonies
- Standard Order of Business
- Grange Knowledge
- Permissible Motions

Questions will be drawn from the most current editions of the Grange Subordinate Manual and Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised.

Additional Rules

President's debate points = Ability to preside, use of the gavel

Only the top 2 debates will be scored

Time limit-deduct 2 points per second over 15 minutes

Conclusions reached = did team deal with business appropriately; no motions left on the floor;

do the decisions make sense?

Opening Ceremonies Memorization – 5 points deducted for each person not having memorized these Tie Breakers for Teams will be in the following order:

Secretary's Minutes

Written Test-Sum of all scores

Oral Questions-Sum of all scores (will also be used to break ties for the team written test award)

Example Oral Questions:

Master: What type of vote is required to postpone definitely? Overseer: Is a second needed to refer a motion to a committee?

Steward: What vote is needed for a point of order?

Chaplain: What is the purpose of (Call the) Previous Question?

Secretary: What are the three motions that may interrupt the speaker?

Gatekeeper: What is the purpose of Division of the Assembly?

Grange Jeopardy

Grange Jeopardy is an exciting event that brings together youth and young adults interested in Grange trivia and history. Individuals have the opportunity to gain knowledge about the Grange, its history and impact on rural America. This factsheet serves as a guideline to prepare Grangers for a Grange Jeopardy competition.

Background

The Jeopardy program is set up for anyone who has an interest in Grange history, trivia and structure. Grange Jeopardy gives you the opportunity to expand your knowledge of the organization in many different areas, while enhancing your critical thinking, problem solving, communications and listening skills. The competition is for individuals between the ages of 14-35, as of January 1 of the year competing.

Preparation

In Jeopardy, individuals compete against each other earning points for correctly answering questions about the Grange and rural issues. Questions can be obtained by visiting www.nationalgrangeyouth.org to review past national trivia challenges or using Grange resources such as the current edition of the Grange blue manual, Grange publications, websites, Grange Digest, Grange bylaws, and history books.

Selection

A state selection system will be set up to determine who will compete at the regional level. The winner will be selected by a written Grange knowledge test or state jeopardy contest, developed by the state youth department or a state-level trivia test is available from the National Grange Youth department. The state winner is based on the highest test score. State youth/young adult directors will score the tests.

Each state can send up to three contestants to the regional contest. The regional contest will be conducted at each regional youth and/ or leader's conference. The regional contest will follow the same format as the national contest with several semi-final rounds, based on the number of entrants and one final round. A minimum of 2 per round advances to the final round. In the case of only one semi-final round, the top six contestants will advance.

National contest description is as follows:

The national contest accepts a maximum three contestants from each region. A minimum of 2 per round advance to the semi-final round. In the case of only one semi-final round, the top six contestants will advance. There will be up to eight per semifinal round and one final round with up to 8 participants.

Each round consists of six categories, each with five questions, with a point value of 100, 200, 300, 400 and 500 points. A maximum of eight players compete at one time.

In round 1, all contestants participate. A random selection of who selects the first question takes place. Contestants wishing to answer a question must activate the signaling device. Once a contestant signals to answer the question, the question will be covered. Answers are in the form of a question. If answered incorrectly, the question will reappear for another contestant to answer. Contestants have 10 seconds to signal after the question is completed. Points are awarded for correctly answering questions. There

are deductions for wrong answers, answering without signaling, not waiting to be recognized and failing to give an answer. The amount of points deducted is determined by the point value of the question. The player with the last correct answer gets to select the next category and point value.

An individual's score must be greater than zero to advance to any final round of play. The top contestants (up to 4 in each heat) from round 1 will advance to play a second round. At the end of round 2, each contestant will have the opportunity to answer a "Final Jeopardy" question, providing they have positive points. The answer will be in written form. Contestants can wager all, part or none of the points they have accumulated. Rankings are based on top scores. The contestant with the most points is declared the champion.

Please note: All trivia questions and answers prepared for the contest are final and cannot be challenged at the time of the contest.

•First Place: \$25 regional winners; an Amazon gift card winner

•Second Place: \$20 regional winners; \$100 winner

•Third Place: \$15 regional winners; \$50 national winner

Right on Target Youth Committee Award

DEADLINE: September 1, 2019

A Granger or a group of Grangers who work together to reach out to the youth in their community can earn this award by setting a goal and sharing their accomplishment. Subordinate, Pomona Grange and State Youth Programs are eligible for consideration.

The goal of their project, the plan of action and result must be submitted to the National Grange Youth Development Director to be considered for the award. Photos are not required but encouraged.

Each member of the planning and implementation committee will receive a certificate of recognition.

While the deadline for reports is September 1, reports can be sent to the National Youth Director at any time for display at the National convention. Reports should contain a written summary of what was planned and the results of the project along with pictures that show what happened.

Entries must contain the names of the Grange members working on the project, along with a main contact name, address, phone number, Grange name and number.

The National Grange Youth Department is designed to encourage youth and young adults to progress as leaders in our Granges and communities. Grange youth have the opportunity to craft a unique program set utilizing the National Grange Youth Department's achievement award program.

For each seal earned, Grange youth and young adults are able to fill in a starpoint in each Grange achievement award program. Based on activity level and service, Grange youth can achieve a bronze, silver or gold award. The qualifying Granger will receive a unique award for each level completed. This is a cumulative award and seals will be earned over multiple years.

Award requirements are as follows.

Bronze: 100 seals | Silver: 200 seals | Gold: 300 seals.

In order to receive an award, the state youth director will need to submit a letter of recommendation, including a record of seals earned. A scanned image of the youth record poster will work.

2019 Leadership Award for Outstanding Youth

DEADLINE: Postmarked by September 1, 2019

This award is designed to recognize outstanding Grange Youth who go above and beyond in leading the Grange through membership development, leadership growth and grassroots efforts.

This award can be designed to meet individual needs, however, they will need to complete the following:

- 1. Earn a minimum of three different achievement award seals can be from the same program or a combination of several.
- 2. Complete the Grange Trivia Challenge; earn a minimum of 80 percent
- 3. Complete one of the following ritual elements: demonstrate the salutation, code reading or participate in the presentation of one of the Grange degrees.
- 4. Participate in a project that promotes the Grange and/or Grange youth department or complete a Right on Target award application.
- 5. Demonstrate leadership in the Grange.

Some examples of projects that will qualify for parts of this award are as follows:

- Conduct a workshop that you develop and present.
- Write a resolution and present it to your Grange for consideration.
- Participate in a legislative event.
- Organize a letter writing campaign for a worthy cause.
- Participate in any type of leadership program
- Share your Grange Spirit by helping create a display for a local event, a brochure promoting a Grange project, event or your local Grange. Help or create a Grange newsletter, or web site, etc.
- Participate in, promote, spearhead or organize a community service project in your Grange or volunteer at a local charity or charity event.
- Share your heart by serving as a mentor to a Junior Grange as a helper. Serve as a camp counselor at Junior Grange Camp or some other group.
- Help your Subordinate, Pomona, or State Lecturer with a program.
- Other leadership activities or projects not mentioned above.

Proof of your accomplishment must be submitted to the National Grange Youth Development Director postmarked by September 1. A simple report, including picture, name, address, Grange name and number or a letter from those you helped can be used a proof. Entries may also qualify for an achievement award seal. Each youth submitting proof will receive a special certificate and a lapel pin in recognition of their individual efforts.

Achievement Awards may be earned by any Grange member any age. If you feel this is something that you would like to participate in and take the time and effort to meet the requirements and wish to receive a certificate, please complete the tasks for each seal and certificate.

William Saunders Agricultural Achievement Award

Sapphire: Visit a local farm and talk with the farmer about what it is like to run a farm. Write a short essay describing what you learned and send it to the National Youth Director. Or, if you live on a farm, develop a "know your farmer" project that could be shared at a Grange meeting or other outreach program. For example, Ag in the Classroom, farm-city day, dairy princess promotion or agriculture day on the hill.

Emerald: select an area of interest; learn as much about your selection as you can, prepare an exhibit and exhibit it at a community/county fair, Grange fair or exhibit day or meeting, trade fair, or in a local business. (Examples include: animals, crops, home improvements, home economics skills, science, wood working, mechanical, computer technology, photography, art, musical talent, theatrical talents, etc.) Take pictures of your project, keep records of the expenses involved in the project, compare the costs involved with the potential profit, evaluate and write a conclusion about your project. Keep all your information in a notebook and present it to your State Youth Director who will apply for your Achievement Award.

Grange youth participating in the following NJHA contests qualify for an emerald award: Horticulture Artwork, Horticultural Photography: Digital Imagery, Horticultural Photography: Still Film; Promotion of Horticulture; Writing in Horticulture.

Silver: Develop, print and distribute a brochure, table tent card or display of your Grange and display at your local or state fair. Send a copy of the brochure, table tent card, or a picture of the display to the National Grange Youth Development Director, as well as photos of you at the fair with your display. Or publish a newsletter for your Grange or develop and/or design or maintain a Webpage or create a video or PowerPoint presentation promoting your Grange or a special activity sponsored by the Grange that could also be presented at a local or state fair. Also included are Facebook and YouTube presentations. Send a copy to the National Grange Youth Development Director.

Ruby: Plant a garden or a plant or develop an agriculture enterprise (livestock, dairy, direct farm sales, etc.) and keep a diary of the progress through pictures and words. Keep all your information in a notebook or record book and present it to your State Youth Director who will apply for your Achievement Award. 4-H and FFA record books may be utilized for record keeping.

Grange youth participating in the following NJHA contests qualify for a ruby award: Horticultural Demonstration; Horticulture Identification and Judging Contest; NJHA's Next Top Chef; Science and Horticulture: Environmental Awareness; Science and Horticulture: Experimental Horticulture; Science and Horticulture: Production: Awareness; Speaking in Horticulture; Extemporaneous Speaking Contest; Horticultural Performing Arts.

Gold: Organize a mutual event with your local FFA, 4-H, or other agricultural organization and your subordinate/community or Pomona Grange. Let these groups explain what they do and do the same for the Grange. Have some kind of activity for the two groups to do together, such as games, discussions about agriculture, etc. Have the appropriate Grange director/Master (president) verify participation and send a copy to the National Youth Director.

Win NJHA Grand National Award at 2019 contests.

Any member who completes all five levels in one calendar year will receive a special Achievement Award lapel pin.

John Trimble Legislative Achievement Award

Sapphire: Plan a legislative night for your subordinate/community or Pomona Grange. Invite local elected officials to your meeting and have them discuss issues important to your Grange. Or, present a workshop on the legislative process or legislative/policy topic of interest. Have the appropriate Grange director/Master (president) verify participation and send a copy to the National Youth Director.

Emerald: Research an issue important to your community, state or nation. See if there is an existing Grange policy. Review existing policy and decide if it is still current. If no policy exists or the current Grange policy needs updating, write a resolution for Grange passage. Submit the resolution for consideration at your subordinate/community Grange. Write a report on your findings and any actions that were taken. If contest available, have the report judged at a state Grange session. Have state youth director verify the work and send a copy to the National Youth Director.

Silver: Participate in the state Grange legislative experience as a state session delegate for your subordinate/community or Pomona Grange or in a state legislative experience program. Or, participate in a state or national Grange legislative day/trip/fly-in. Or prepare and deliver a persuasive speech at a Regional Youth Conference in the Prepared Speech Division that focuses on a specific Grange policy and

advocacy strategies. Or schedule a meeting with an elected official to discuss a Grange issue. Have the appropriate Grange director/Master (president) verify participation.

Ruby: Work with your State Legislative Director or State Master/President to organize or participate in a Legislative Day at your State House. Or, participate in the National Grange Legislative Fly-In. Have state youth director verify the work and send a copy to the National Youth Director.

Gold: Participate in the John Trimble Legislative Youth Experience at National Session. Submit an application for the Grassroots Activism Award. Or, participate in the National Grange Legislative Fly-In.

Any member who completes all five levels in one calendar year will receive a special Achievement Award lapel pin.

John Thompson Ritual Achievement Award

Sapphire: Research one of the seven degrees and think about how you can apply the lessons from this degree to your daily life. Write a short essay about what you have learned and send it to the National Youth Director.

Emerald: Memorize the Master, Overseer, or Chaplain's charges in the opening ceremony of your subordinate/community or Pomona Grange and recite them to the appropriate Master/President. Have the appropriate Grange director/Master (president) verify participation and send a copy to the National Youth Director.

Silver: Memorize the obligation ceremony or welcoming ceremony; recite it to your subordinate Master, state youth director or state master. Have the qualified individual verify and send verification letter to National Youth Director.

Ruby: Organize a ritual workshop for youth and young adults in your state. Include the opening and closing, as well as degree work. Send a copy of the plan for the workshop to the National Youth Director.

Gold: Participate in the National Youth Officer Team or State Youth Officer Team. Or, read opening and closing ceremonies in the code book of the National Grange to a qualified individual, with five mistakes or less. Compete in the National Grange Code Reading Contest

Any member who completes all five levels in one calendar year will receive a special Achievement Award lapel pin.

Drill Achievement Award

Drills are impressive and a method of teaching team work. Learning to work with other people is an important skill in life. The Founders worked as a team to create this wonderful organization and many people over the years have continued to work as a team to keep it going. Minimum number of People in a Drill: Three. There is no maximum limit.

Sapphire: To earn this seal an individual must participate in a drill presentation at your subordinate or Pomona Grange; or participate in a school drill or other organization drill. You will need to obtain a letter from the Grange, school or organization official verifying your participation.

Emerald: Participate in a drill presentation at your state Grange Youth Camp, Convention/Session or Drill competition. You will need to obtain a letter from an official verifying your participation and send it to the National Grange Youth Development Director.

Silver: Participate in a Regional Drill presentation or competition.

Ruby: Create an original Drill and lead a group in the drill at your local Grange, Pomona Grange, state Grange, regional conference or in a school or other organization setting. Submit a copy of the drill to the National Youth Development Director along with a list of all the participants.

Gold: Prepare and present a workshop on drills. Send a copy of your material to the National Youth Development Director with the date the workshop was presented and the number of people who attended along with your evaluation for improving the workshop.

Any member who completes all five levels in one calendar year will receive a special Achievement Award lapel pin.

Oliver Hudson Kelly Public Speaking Achievement Award

Sapphire: Prepare and present a speech to your Grange or another group. Your subordinate/ community Grange youth chairman or Master may verify your participation by writing a confirmation letter, which is to be sent to the National Grange Youth Development Director.

Emerald: Present your speech at a Pomona Grange activity or meeting or other county activity. Your Pomona youth chairman or Master may verify your participation by writing a confirmation letter and sending it to the National Grange Youth Development Director.

Silver: Participate in your State Grange's Public Speaking program. State Youth Directors will apply for this Achievement Award for participants. All state winners will compete at the regional program, which will be held at the regional youth conferences.

Youth Ambassadors and Young Patrons can also earn a silver seal for speaking at a state-level Grange event.

Grange youth participating in the following NJHA contests qualify for a silver award: Horticultural Demonstration; Horticulture Identification and Judging Contest; NJHA's Next Top Chef; Science and Horticulture: Environmental Awareness; Science and Horticulture: Experimental Horticulture; Science and Horticulture: Production: Awareness; Speaking in Horticulture; Extemporaneous Speaking Contest; Horticultural Performing Arts.

Ruby: Participate in your regional Public Speaking program or contest.

Gold: Prepare and present a workshop on public speaking for your Grange or another group. Obtain a letter of confirmation from the Master or person in charge of the group and send it to the National Grange Youth Development Director. Present a speech at the National Grange Evening of Excellence or serve as presenter for a National Youth Department program.

Any member who completes all five levels in one calendar year will receive a special Achievement Award lapel pin.

Francis McDowell Grange Trivia Challenge

Purpose: To increase Grange knowledge and history.

The challenge will be in a written format. The questions will include but not be limited to the Grange fourth degree manual, the Digest, Grange history books, the National Grange Officers and Directors, and local news media (national and international stories).

Awards

The award will be a certificate noting the completion of challenge for those who score above 75%. Challenges may be obtained at any time by contacting the National Youth Development Director or from the National Grange Youth Website at www.nationalgrangeyouth.org. When you have completed the challenge return it to the National Youth Development Director.

Horizon Leadership participants and National Youth Officer Team members will be expected to complete the Trivia Challenge prior to attending and participating in the National convention.

Grange Youth achieving a perfect score on the test will be recognized at National Session during the Youth Activity Days.

Aaron B. Grosh Mentoring Award

To encourage Youth to mentor Junior Grange members.

Sapphire - Assist the Junior Grange leader with the Junior Grange meetings and activities - obtain a letter confirming your assistance from the Junior Leader and send it to the National Grange Youth Development Director. If no Junior Grange exists in your area, work with your local and State Grange leadership on a plan to start a Junior Grange.

Emerald: This level can be earned one of four ways:

1. Assist in the establishment of a Junior Grange Program in your subordinate/community or Pomona Grange; or 2. Serve as a Junior Grange leader at the community or Pomona level; or 3. Lead a Junior Grange service, community or fun activity - a minimum of six (6) service hours is required. For certification, obtain a letter from adult leader and submit it to the National Grange Youth Development Director.

Silver: Become a counselor for your State Junior Grange Camp; obtain a letter from the camp director confirming your participation as a counselor, which should be sent to the National Grange Youth Development Director. You may also plan a large-scale activity for Juniors and Youth to interact if there is no Junior Grange Camp in your State or area.

Ruby: Assist with state session/convention Junior Grange activities, including assist Juniors with the presentation of the Junior Degree, Junior Grange tour, Junior Grange talent show or other State Junior Department events. If there are no formal Junior Grange activities, be a buddy to a junior member attending the state convention. Obtain a letter from an official stating your participation from your state junior director and give a copy of it to the National Grange Youth Development Director.

Gold: Assist with national session/convention Junior Grange activities, including presentation of the Junior Degree, leading Junior Grange workshops, or Junior Grange event set up. Or, the seal can be earned by leading a workshop at a State or National Junior Grange event or by submitting a Junior badge or program idea to both the National Junior director and the National Grange Youth Director.

Any member who completes all five levels in one calendar year will receive a special Achievement Award lapel pin.

Caroline Hall Achievement Award

Caroline A. Hall is recognized as the "eighth" founder of the Grange. One of the many gifts she brought to the organization was the gift of music. She was a major force behind the production of the first Grange Song Book. This award will recognize those who are still contributing talent to the Grange and to their community. Another of the things she was noted for was her contributions to her community.

Sapphire: Share a specific talent you have in one of your Subordinate/Community Grange or your Pomona Grange programs. Obtain a letter of verification from the program chairman and send a copy of it to the National Grange Youth Development Director. The letter should include the date of performance, presentation of the event such as a photo and the number of people in attendance.

Emerald: Participate in a community service project in your Grange or your community. Obtain a letter of verification from the project coordinator and send a copy of it to the National Grange Youth Development Director. The letter should include the dates you helped with the project and as many specifics as possible.

Silver: Share a specific talent you have at one of your State Grange activities or enter a talent contest which doesn't have to be a Grange Talent contest. Obtain a letter of verification from the program chairman or contest coordinator and send a copy of it to the National Grange Youth Development Director. The letter should include the date of performance and the number of people in attendance.

Ruby: Share a specific talent at a regional conference, assist with planning games or workshops. Obtain a letter of verification from the program chairman and send a copy of it to the National Grange Youth Development Director. The letter should include the date of performance and the number of people in attendance.

Gold: Assist in organizing or organize a local Grange or community talent show or a service project. Newsletters and other forms of publicity should be utilized. Submit a copy of the program, which includes the names of the program or project, the names of the people participating and the title of their performance with the number in attendance and date to the National Grange Youth Development Director.

Participate in or organize a fundraiser for a charity and complete a report for the Caroline A. Hall T.L.C. recognition program. For the report, send details on the event/ speaker, number in attendance, and preplanning and post planning checklists/comments.

Any member who completes all levels in one calendar year will receive a special Achievement award lapel pin.

William Ireland Deaf Awareness Achievement Award

For many years, the National Grange has recognized the importance of communication skills and community service. One program that has been the hallmark of the organization has been its commitment to deaf awareness. The National Grange Youth program recognizes our long-term association with this issue with a unique achievement award.

Sapphire: Learn the manual alphabet. Demonstrate it to someone proficient in sign language. (It can be done at a Sign-a-Song contest). Send verification letter to National Youth Development Director.

Emerald: Develop a deaf awareness display or program. Present/display it at a subordinate/community or Pomona Grange meeting or in some other public venue or school presentation. Send a copy of the program or photo of this display, with verification letter from the local youth director or Master (president) to the National Youth Development Director.

Silver: Participate in state sign-a-song contest, enter an educational display at State Session, or present a workshop on sign language at a state session, state youth camp or state youth conference. State Youth Director, Community Service/Deaf Activities Director or State Master will apply for the award. Ruby: Participate in a regional Sign-a-Song contest or present a speech on deaf awareness at regional youth conference.

Gold: Participate in the National Session Evening of Excellence Sign a Song contest or develop an education publication (such as brochure, Website, PowerPoint, video, etc.) to promote deaf awareness and/or sign language.

Any member who completes five levels in one calendar year will receive a special Achievement Award lapel pin and other appropriate award.

Horizon Leadership Ambassador/Young Patron Program

DEADLINE: Sept. 1

The purpose of the Horizon Leadership Ambassador program is to provide an opportunity for Youth, Young Adults and Young Couples, selected to represent their state at a National Grange convention, to build their leadership potential; broaden their view of the Grange by experiencing a National Convention; receive educational training to use in their own states; and build relationships with Grangers throughout the nation by having fun.

The National Grange Horizon Leadership Ambassador program is an opportunity for youth selected by their state to participate in activities as guests of The Grange Foundation, Youth Leadership Fund. The National Grange will provide scholarship assistance toward room and meal costs at the National Grange convention for Horizon Leadership Ambassador program.

Each state may send two youth (one male, one female) and two young adults or a young couple, who meet the following criteria:

- 1. Youth ambassadors must be 16-21 years of age at the time of their state selection, have observed their 16th birthday, but not their 23rd birthday by December 31 of the year they attend the National session. These individuals must also be single, never been married, may not have children and must not marry and/or have children during term of service. If under 18, must have parent's consent.
- 2. Young Adults/Young Couples must be between the ages of 22-35, have observed their 22nd birthday, but not their 37th birthday by December 31 of the year they attend national session.
- 3. Ambassadors/ Young Adults/Young Patrons must have been a Grange member for a minimum of one year at the time they attend National Session.
- 4. Previous State Ambassadors/Young Patrons/ Young Adults who have participated in this program at the National Grange Convention are not eligible. Exception: Young Adults who are former Youth Ambassadors are eligible to participate in the Young Patron Program.
- 5. Ambassadors/Young Adults/Young Patrons must meet their state's requirements.
- 6. Ambassadors/Young Adults/Young Patrons must be able to attend the National convention to represent their state during Youth activities days. (Wednesday evening through Saturday). The Ambassadors/ Outstanding Young Adults/Young Couples must complete three seals in the Oliver Hudson Kelly Achievement Award. They must also complete one of the John Thompson Ritual Achievement Awards.
- 7. Ambassadors/Young Adults/Young Patrons must also complete the requirements for a minimum of 2 seals of any of the other achievement awards between September 1 of the previous year and October 15 of the current year.
- 8. Ambassadors/Young Patrons/Young Adults must attend a regional youth conference in the past five years before national session, and attend a state session in the past two years.

- 9. Each Horizon Leadership Ambassador/ Young Adults/Young Patrons will be expected to complete a Grange trivia challenge with a score of at least 80% prior to attending the convention. Trivia Challenge must be returned to the National Director by October 15 of the current year. Trivia challenges may be obtained from the National Director or the National Grange Website www.nationalgrangeyouth.org.
- 10. Official Application form must be completed and postmarked by September 1. Send to the National Grange Youth Development Director. The application must include a summary of your Grange activities in the following areas: Fellowship, Activities, Recognition, Leadership, Service, and membership.
- 11. The following letters of recommendation are to be sent with the application:
- a. Subordinate Grange, preferably Master or Secretary.
- b. State Master
- c. State Youth Director (if applicable)
- 12. Horizon Leadership youth ambassadors will be housed together at the National Grange Convention with up to three other official participants per room.
- 13. Young Adults will be housed in the same area with up to three other official participants per room. Young couples will be housed one per room.
- 14. Horizon Leadership Ambassadors/ Outstanding Young Patrons will be recognized at the National Convention.
- 15. Ambassadors/ Young Patrons or their individual states are responsible for their own transportation and convention registration fee.
- 16. The Grange Foundation Youth Leadership fund will provide each ambassador with the following tickets: A. Tour B. Pizza Party C. Banquet D. Invitation to A.O.L.E./G.R.O.W. Club Dinner
- 17. Any participant who fails to comply with the guidelines set up will be expected to pay their own expenses.
- 18. Youth Ambassadors/Outstanding Young Patrons are asked to bring a ½ inch wide binder with photos and highlights from their year as ambassador or Young Patron to National Session. The binders will be placed on display in the idea fair and reviewed by the judges.

- The Grange Youth Officers Team will march in, open the Grange in the fourth degree and march out.
- Master, Overseer, Steward, A.S., L.A.S., G.K., and Chaplain have speaking parts.
- Lecturer will need to select an opening song.
- Secretary will need to be prepared to call the roll of Youth officers which will be established following the application process. Secretary is responsible for learning how to pronounce the names of the officers correctly.
- Ceres, A.S., and L.A.S. will need to know how to present the flag properly according to the Official Flag presentation ceremony offered by the National Grange.
- A.S. and L.A.S. may submit suggestions for the seating & retiring drill. Also please limit the time of the opening drill to 6 minutes and the retiring drill to 3 minutes.
- Musician applicants must submit a musical demonstration tape or CD. Musical piece should be no more than 3 minutes. Musician may make suggestions for March Music. The National Youth Development Director will screen any music suggestions for appropriateness.
- There are 18 offices to be filled: Master, Overseer, Lecturer, Steward, A.S., L.A.S., Chaplain, Treasurer, Secretary, Gatekeeper., Ceres, Pomona, Flora, and four executive committee positions and Musician.
- Those applying for a position should be Grange members who are at least 14 years of age and not over 35 years of age.
- The National Grange Youth Development Director will contact each applicant with additional questions during the selection process.
- The selection process will be based on letters of recommendation as well as the application. Youth previously serving as Master are ineligible for re-application.
- Each applicant will be notified of the results no later than October 1, so that each has adequate time to make travel arrangements. Each member of the N.G.Y.O.T. will receive a special certificate.
- Applicants are required to prove that they have earned a minimum of three achievement awards, which have been earned between August 31 of the previous year and September 1 this year. One award seal must be completed in the John Thompson Ritual Achievement Award. They will also need to complete the Grange Trivia Test.
- Applicants must submit a letter of recommendation from a member of their local Grange -preferably master and state youth director, and state Master.
- Applicants must be committed to memorizing their speaking part if the office they are applying to fill has a speaking part. Each Applicant must be willing to comply with the dress guidelines that will be established for Youth officers.
- Current Horizon Leadership Ambassadors and John Trimble Youth Legislative Experience delegates are not eligible to apply.
- Youth housing at the National convention will be available for any who wish to participate. If funds are available in the Grange Foundation Youth Leadership Fund financial assistance will be given for lodging and meals. If funds are not available all expenses incurred will be the responsibility of the youth participating.

National Convention Youth Legislative Experience will provide opportunities for one or two Grange Youth, age 16-35, with an interest in the legislative aspect of the National Grange to see the inner workings of committees and the grassroots legislative policy development effort at the National Grange Convention.

- Each youth will serve on one of the legislative committees reviewing resolutions as a voting member of the committee and as a youth staff assistant to the National Grange Legislative Director. Participants will watch the delegate body take action on the resolutions and assist in other ways.
- An individual may participate in the program a maximum of one time.
- As a youth staff assistant they will be assigned some additional logistical duties so that they can see how the backroom production process works at the convention. These duties will not conflict with the opportunities of seeing the National Delegates work on the floor.
- As guests of the National Grange their room cost will be paid (which will be shared with other participants) plus meals or tickets to certain meal functions.
- Transportation will be participant's responsibility.
- Any participant who fails to comply with the guidelines set up will be expected to pay their own expenses.
- Applications will be submitted to the National Youth Development Director, who will share applications with National Legislative Director and National Master in making selection of participants and assignment to committee.

2019 Regional Public Speaking Competition

(Age Categories Updated)

There will be three categories this year along with three age divisions as follows:

- 1. Youth: 14-21 years of age
- 2. Young adult 22-35 years of age
- 3. Adult 36+ years of age.

The age of the contestant as of January 1 determines the age group.

For state, regional and national public speaking contests, props will be allowed, but must be appropriately sized for the room. Points can be deducted for props.

Category A: Prepared speech

Contestant's choice of topic – Contestants in Category A will be required to answer an impromptu question at the end of their speech. The questions will be related to the contestant's chosen speech topic. This will include William Ireland Communication Achievement Award speeches. Speeches must be a minimum of 3 minutes and a maximum of 5 minutes. At National, regional winners' speeches will be judged and the best two will present at the Evening of Excellence.

Category B: Radio Spot Contest

A radio spot is an advertisement promoting the Grange. Pretend you're a "DJ" and you're doing a commercial for the Grange. Can include one or two people in the radio spot.

Radio spots should be exactly 60 seconds in length and may include a musical or sound effect introduction and/or background, but may not include a spoken introduction or "tag" by another other than the contestant. If music or sound effect is used, the contestant must provide and operate the sound-making device. The contestant will provide a complete written script (including notations about music/sound effects) to the timekeeper to aid in timing accuracy.

Musical/sound effect introductions and endings are considered a part of the radio spot and must not cause the 60 second time limit to be exceeded. The spot should relate to the Grange, be original and created by the contestant.

Category C: Impromptu Speeches

An impromptu speech is delivered without preparation or thought ahead of time. No note cards are used, and topics are generally drawn.

- We hope that by establishing an impromptu speech category that members will build confidence and in the future participate in the prepared speeches or the radio speech category.
- Impromptu speeches should be at least one minute in length and not longer than 5 minutes.
- Time keeper will hold up hand when the 1 minute mark has been reached and then 4.30 minute mark has been reached so speaker knows when he/she can stop.
- Participants will draw two topics, select their choice of the two and return the other one.
- Competition will be held at the Regional Conferences You need not have participated in a state competition in order to participate.
- Participants must notify National Director of intent to enter prior to the beginning of the contest.

Impromptu speaking will be judged on the following criteria:

- Voice Spoke clearly, easy to understand;
- Stage Presence dressed neatly and appropriately, posture, nervousness, etc.;
- Expression Delivered speech with enthusiasm and emotion;
- Confidence in speaking, Content of speech;
- Clarity of thoughts and ideas on topic.
- One point will be deducted for every 30 seconds a participant is under or over the time established.

Prizes

National Grange will provide ribbons to the top three entrants in each division and age category along with cash prizes.

Prepared Speeches will receive \$20 for 1st, \$15 for 2nd and \$10 for 3rd.

Impromptu and Elevator Speeches will receive \$15 for 1st place, \$10 for 2nd and \$5 for 3rd. There will be a special award presented to the Best of Show at the regional contest, plus a cash award of \$25.

One Overall Winner from each region will be selected to showcase at the National Grange Convention.

To advance to the National Convention, Grangers must compete in their local region.

Impromptu Public speaking category entries are not eligible for Best of Show. Each Best of Show that showcases at the National Grange convention will receive \$100.

2019 Sign-A-Song Regional Contest

Updated for 2019

Novice – one who is beginning to learn sign, has had no more than three sign language classes and has entered the sign-a-song contest no more than two years.

Hobbyist – one who signs on an occasional basis and strictly for fun. One who has entered the sign a song contest more than two years.

Group – two or more people signing.

Expert – one who signs professionally. Ineligible for Best of Show, but looking for opportunity to encourage others to participate.

Rules

- 1. Each state may send one entry in each category to the regional competition. Selection of the state winners is under the jurisdiction of the State Grange
- 2. Participants are to supply the National Youth Development Director with three copies of the words to the song they are signing.
- 3. Participants must provide their own music. A CD player and speakers will be available.
- 4. Anyone who is a professional instructor or receives money for signing may only enter in the expert category. Expert category entries are ineligible for the Best of Show. If there is a professional signer in a group entry, it is only eligible in the Expert category.
- 5. Signers must use total communication techniques: Sign Language, facial expressions, mouthing of words for lip reading, finger spelling if appropriate, and body movement.
- 6. Participants must be Grange members.
- 7. Props and costumes are permitted, rhythm is optional.
- 8. Only one song may be signed during the competition performance.
- 9. Participants must sign their own name and song title.
- 10. Participants must inform the audience and judges what type of sign language they will be using. (Pidgin, ASL, ESL, etc.)

Judging guidelines for 2019 Sign-A-Song Contest (100 pts. Total)

Sign language ability, signs clearly with correct interpretation - 32 points

Body expression, displays emotion, expresses key thoughts with body movement, mouths words for lip reading - 30 points

Presentation, interpret with confidence, uniformity (group) - 25 points

Song selection is appropriate, with a clear meaning and is suitable for the participant's signing ability - 10 points

Signed their own name - 1 point

Signed title of Song - 1 point

Informed judges and Audience of type of sign language being used - 1 point

Prizes

National Grange will provide ribbons for each regional contest for first, second and third. First place will receive \$20, 2nd place \$15 and 3rd place \$10.

The Best of Show will receive a special award and an additional cash award of \$25 and be eligible to showcase at the National Grange Convention in November. To be eligible to participate in National Showcase, you must advance from your local region. Showcase acts will receive \$100 for participating.
