

Monday, February 10, 2025 (day 29 of the 120-day Session)

Week five of the 2025 legislative session will be a full week of policy bill hearings with executive (voting) sessions sprinkled in as we get closer to some of our session cutoffs. As of this writing, there have been 934 House bills, and 721 Senate bills introduced totaling 1,655 policy bills. Committee hearings will be moving at a faster pace as hearing schedules begin to fill up and the threat of the death-by-calendar looms.

Because we are in an "odd" year, the next revenue forecast will come out on March 20th. This revenue forecast will give budget writers their final look at what the fiscal landscape will be as they hone-in on writing the final 2025-2027 Operating Budget.

Bill Action:

Pesticide Application Safety Committee

HB 1294-Extending the pesticide application safety committee. Bipartisan sponsored by Rep. Dent and Reeves, changes the currently expiring expiration date of the pesticide application safety committee to July 1, 2035. The bill had a public hearing in the House Committee on Agriculture and successful executive action was taken on it in committee vote on Friday, February 7.

Property Tax Increases

<u>HB 1334</u> -Is scheduled for public hearing in the Finance Committee on February 11th. This bill would allow local governments to triple property tax increases from 1% to 3% without a vote. This goes back on long-sought precedent to cap property tax increases in-order to protect fixed income and economically vulnerable citizens. We will continue to see many new versions of revenue-capture by the state this session in order to fill the \$12 billion hole.

Cattle Methane Emissions Reporting

<u>HB 1630</u> mandates the reporting of methane emissions from dairy cows & feedlot cattle. After rule implementation, dairy farm or feedlot owners or operators in the state will be required to submit an annual report to the department detailing the total metric tons of methane emitted from their operations during the previous calendar year. For the first report, operators may estimate the total emissions by multiplying the average monthly emissions over a consecutive three-month period within the reporting year. The department is tasked with establishing rules for this process, including a reporting schedule that allows adequate time for the first report.

Opponents of the bill fear this may be the first step toward a potential per-head cow tax in the future. The bill had a public hearing in the Environment & Energy committee on February 6. It was one of the most effective hearings this session, with roughly 1600 people opposing the bill compared to roughly 400 in support. Look for this bill to be paired down or turned into a study for future legislation as we get closer to policy committee cutoff.

In The News:

There is a lot of education policy in the news these days around the Parents Bill of Rights policy passed last session and the new bill, Senate Bill 5181. This vear's bill reverses course on some provisions and amends the parent's rights initiative to bring it into alignment with existing law. Opponents of the bill see this as a bait-and-switch effort as the majority party passed the parental rights bill at the end of session (Initiative 2081) in order to keep it from getting an initiative vote on the general election ballot. The Washington State Standard did a great job or summarizing the policy battle brewing right now in Olympia in this piece.

Start here: https://app.leg.wa.gov/csiremote/ Select House or Senate Committee: Choose the committee where you bill is being heard Meetings: Choose the date of the hearing

Select the bill you want from the list. Select: I would like to submit written testimony. I would like to testify live during the hearing. I would like my position noted for the legislative record.

You may check to see who else has signed in to testify.

On the next screen, fill in all the blanks and submit.

You will receive an email with a link for the hearing. At the appropriate time, join the meeting and wait to be admitted.

When you are called to speak, introduce yourself and speak for 1-2 minutes.

To prepare, write down what you want to say. Read it aloud several times. Time yourself.
